Yeah, we had it today, in spades! The NWS forecast 10 – 20 mph winds, with possible gusts to 25 mph. How do they know this stuff??? The winds we experienced, as recorded on the firing line, were between 11 and 17 mph, with periods of extended gusting up to 26 mph! This was primarily out of the north.
