To give you an idea, I learned that one mildot holdoff at 11 yards with a ½" killzone was needed to drop a target that close. Also 5 ½ mildots holdoff at 55 yards was needed to do the same on a 2" killzone. Who knew???

And here is where it gets even better..... On the Airgun Nation forum, I read that this past weekend, at Diablo Airgun club in CA, Jim Poh erected something that has been labeled "Jim's Folly". He put a ½" target at 55 yards as part of the course. NO ONE dropped that target, but he did get a "few" comments on his match report post about it. Hmmm......Okay, lets do the same thing, but only as a bonus target for our match. We positioned it next to a 2" target at that distance and launched just one shot, actually twice because we shot our usual course twice. Lots of faceplate hits, a few splits (from examining the target afterwards) and one miraculous knockdown! The usual banter was floating back and forth along the line until there was this uproar, followed by Barry Diehl about to do handsprings! He had knocked down his 2 close shots, figured the hold off and down his 2 long shots, then launched his bonus shot and the target dropped! You think he might have been a bit ecstatic?? Turns out he was high score for the match, too.
